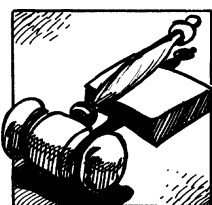

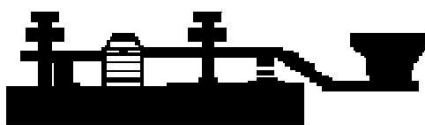

Then, we come home for a few days to recuperate. Next, we are off to Glacier-Waterton Hamfest.

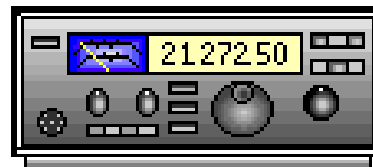

GOVERNOR'S CUP 2004

With only one club meeting left before the Governor's Cup on June 5, we will use the May meeting to discuss plans for our participation in the Governor's Cup activities. If you have signed up to work the event, try to attend the meeting so that you will be aware of what will be happening. If you wish to volunteer and have not yet done so, please contact Rich KC7VVZ or Bob K7HLN to obtain a registration form.

Little has changed since last year, other than the individual coordinating the event. The bib colors and the numbering system remain the same. Start times also stay the same, so there will be little difference in what we have done before. We do want to be sure that all radio operators are on the same page as far as procedures and information reporting. We will review this information at the club meeting.

Assignments and reporting times will be available at the meeting. If you can't attend the meeting, contact Bob K7HLN or Rich KC7VVZ to get that information. We will also call an informational net on the .82 repeater Friday, June 4 at 1900 hrs to go over last minute details.

Check in with Race Control when you get on station and be sure to check out when you are finished. Do not leave your assigned location until the sweep, Don W7MRI, has gone by on the long courses, or until all runners have gone by your location on the short courses (5 & 10 K).

After you are through with your assignment, stop by the Race Control Unit across from the Civic Center, or at the MCU at the Finish Line on South Park Street, if your schedule permits.

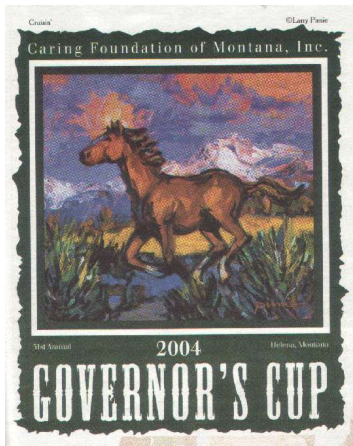

Anderson Powerpoles

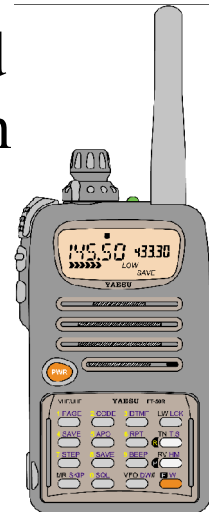

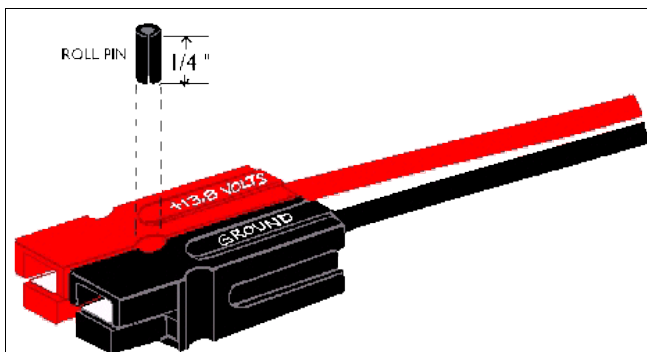


Anderson Powerpoles

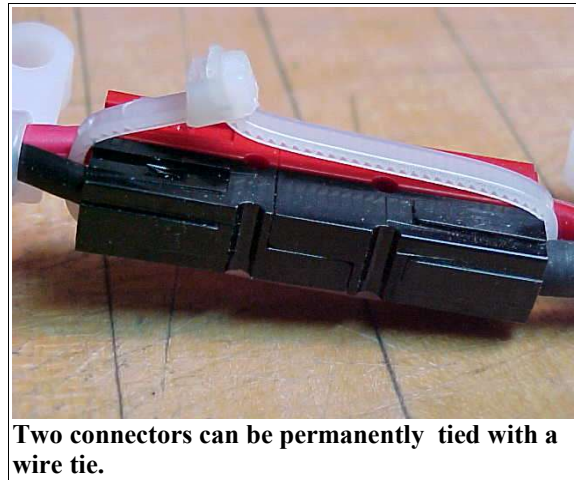
Would you be frustrated if your new kitchen appliance or new power tool did not come with a power plug? Are you frustrated or confused when you open your new 12 Volt radio gear to find that it has no power plug? In this day of "plug and play", why doesn't our 12 Volt gear and accessories have some sort of plugs on them?

Do you have multiple schemes for your 12 Volt power distribution? If you brought your radio to a friends house or to his car, would you have to jerry rig the power connections? Are you relating to any of this?

Problem solved! Here comes the Anderson Powerpole connectors. For higher power rigs, high-amperage DC power supplies and bus-wiring, the Anderson Powerpole is the emerging national ARES/RACES standard. The Anderson Powerpole is genderless, so you don't need adapters to plug a battery into another source to recharge. The 15, 20, and 30 Amp rated contacts for Anderson Powerpole use the same housing, so are interoperable, just use the right fuse. The plastic parts are the same for both sizes. The barrel area (which holds the wire) of the 15-ampere silver-plated contact is smaller than that of the 30-ampere contact, but the contact area is the same.



For the vast majority this is the suggested correct configuration: "Housings should be mated according to the diagram above, viewing from the contact side (opposite the wire side), tongue down, hood up, RED on the LEFT, BLACK on the RIGHT. Also notice the 3/32-inch-diameter roll pin, 1/4 inch long, is used to keep the housings from sliding apart."



Two connectors can be permanently tied with a wire tie.



As shown here, an additional set of connectors on one end allows endless number of devices to be connected (of course keeping in mind the amount of current being drawn). I put two sets on all of my equipment. (Ed.)

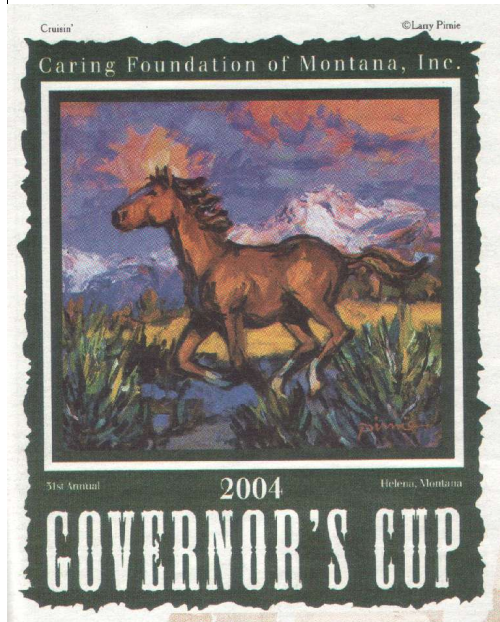
